#### **Post-Disaster Needs Assessment**

- Data gathering from multiple sources
  - Initial notification to residents to submit unmet needs and damages
  - Intelligence gathering from Combined Communications Center, 311
  - County damage assessment teams
  - Post-disaster needs assessment teams
- Continual assessment of unmet needs as we move through recovery to adjust our operations accordingly

#### Request for State/Federal Assistance

- Based on information gathered from residents, damage assessments, and estimated expenditures, Alachua County will request:
  - Inclusion in the Presidential Major Disaster Declaration for all relevant categories of Public and Individual Assistance
    - Hurricanes: Typically included in pre-landfall declaration, federal funding limited to emergency protective measures, no funding for individuals
    - Inclusion in declaration will open up funding reimbursement for government/non-profit disaster work (PA) and funding for Alachua County residents (IA)
    - Federal disaster housing programs
    - Establishment of Disaster Recovery Center(s)
    - Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA)

#### **FEMA Individual Assistance**

- Assistance available to survivors
- FEMA Individual Assistance (IA) improvements

Serious Needs Assistance: Money for essential items (food, formula, medication, etc.)

- Expanded eligibility
  - Removed SBA application requirement
  - Assistance for underinsured individuals
  - Home repair assistance regardless of pre-disaster condition
  - Simplified assistance for self-employed
- Simplified application process
  - Removed barriers for late applications
  - Simplified appeals process



**Disaster Recovery Centers** 

- Locations: Alachua County Libraries
- FEMA
  - Assistance with applying for federal disaster assistance
  - Update on application status
- Small Business Administration
  - Low interest loans for individuals and businesses
- Veterans Services
  - Veteran-specific information and resources
- Department of Children and Families (DCF)
  - WIC, SNAP information
  - Disaster behavioral health
- Tax Collector
  - Drivers license replacement
- Community Support Services
  - Counseling
  - Case management resources



#### **Meeting Short-Term Needs**


- Alachua County Community Organizations Active in Disaster (COAD)
  - Faith-based
  - Non-profits
  - Government agencies
  - Private for-profit
- Food & Water
  - Points of Distribution
  - Mobile kitchens/feeding operations
  - Disaster Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (DSNAP)
    - SNAP recipients will receive additional benefits on their card
    - Individuals who don't receive SNAP can apply for DSNAP to receive food assistance



# Housing

- Immediate
  - Sheltering
    - Risk shelters (hurricanes)
    - Recovery shelters
- Temporary Housing
  - Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA) up to 180 days in hotel
  - FEMA Rental Assistance (individuals whose primary residence was damaged)
  - FEMA Direct Temporary Housing
- Permanent Housing
  - Insurance
  - FEMA home repair assistance

#### **Community Engagement**

- As we plan to spend federal recovery dollars, we will seek input from our community
- Recovery activities will occur with a constant focus on meeting community needs through the lens of equity
  - Resources required in one community may not be what is needed in another community
  - Opportunity to address underinvestment in specific communities during recovery
- Address economic recovery when developing infrastructure projects
- Continually evaluate ways to ensure we are making our whole community aware of the resources available to them
