Request to Advertise an Ordinance for Speed Enforcement in Alachua County School Zones

Description:

Via meetings of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area (MTPO), the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners has asked for information regarding the implementation of a speed detection program for Alachua County School Zones. This item serves to inform the Board of the requirements under F.S. 316.008(9), including the requirement to enact an ordinance to authorize installation of speed detection systems, and to receive Board direction on advertising an ordinance and the time frames to be enforced.

Recommended Action:

- 1. Direct Staff to advertise an ordinance to enact the use of Speed Detection Systems in Alachua County School Zones.
- 2. Direct Staff on the time frames to be enforced consistent with the options in F.S. 316.008(9).

There is no fiscal impact related to this Action item. The proposed model for a speed detection program would involve contracting a qualified vendor who would bear any initial costs for the program. Once operational, the program should be cost neutral or revenue positive.
