## **EMPOWER COALITION BACKGROUND**

The EMPOWER Coalition, led by NKwanda Jah, was formed in 2022 to bring together representatives from the Alachua County neighborhoods of Springhill/Sugarhill, Duval, and SWAG, nonprofit organizations Greater Duval Neighborhood Association, Southwest Advocacy Group, Cultural Arts Coalition, Community Weatherization Coalition and Rebuilding Together North Central Florida, the Alachua County NAACP Environmental and Climate Justice Committee, Alachua County, the City of Gainesville, Santa Fe College, Alachua County Public Schools, CareerSource North Central Florida and Solar Impact. We have been meeting monthly since May of 2022 to work together to benefit our community.

These partners collaborated on successful grant applications to the Department of Energy Local Energy Action Program (LEAP) in 2021 and in 2023. These grants have provided over two years of technical assistance from a team of experts from the National Renewable Energy Laboratory (NREL) since July of 2022, exploring the potential to reduce energy bills for low-income residents through expanded energy efficiency, weatherization, and solar energy and the development of a green jobs pipeline accessible to underserved communities in Alachua County. It is the intention of the EMPOWER Coalition partners to continue to work together to advance these goals.

## **EMPOWER PROJECT ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

Through this shared vision, combined efforts, and pure hard work, the EMPOWER Project team has produced many accomplishments, including:

- Sustained community outreach efforts starting with a kickoff meeting in early 2023 followed by broader community meetings in 2024 and on-going engagement with representatives of our partner neighborhoods of Springhill/Sugarhill, Duval, and SWAG.
- Organized a Green Jobs Pipeline Roundtable Discussion in 2022 focused on creating a "green jobs pipeline" to link programs in public schools' curriculum with vocational training programs, internships, employment, and business and entrepreneurship opportunities.
- Organized monthly Weatherization Coordination meetings that bring together local service providers, resulting in the: creation of a guide to help residents seeking weatherization services; identification of bottlenecks in the provision of services provision; creation of Weatherization Technician Certification modules at Santa Fe College.
- Obtained a \$10,000 grant for green jobs development from Jobs for the Future (JFF), making the team eligible for future rounds of more funding.
- Obtained an Energy Efficiency for Renters grant for technical assistance to improve the functioning of the Alachua County Energy Efficiency Program.
- Designed an innovative solar lease model that fits within the restrictive regulations of the state but also, if funded, will provide significant and long-lasting benefits to our current partner communities and other communities as we seek to expand our outreach.
- Obtained a grant from a private donor to support a pilot project to create a community-managed Community Benefits Fund (CBF) to install a solar array on a County building and generate funds to support the CBF over the long-term.

- Submitted applications for nine grants with funding ranging from \$50,000 to \$35.7 million. Other grant proposals are also in preparation.
- Nominated NKwanda Jah for the 2024 Dr. Espanola Jackson Energy Justice award, which she won in a landslide election.
